AI SENSORIUM

Al Sensorium reflects on the advance of machine learning (ML) and artificial intelligence (Al). Like all the major technology advances in history, with the potential of drastically improving human lives, come unexpected side effects. In AI Sensorium, ODC Resident Artist Kinetech Arts investigates how bodies and minds are transformed, exploited, and manipulated by ML and AI both virtually and physically. Unlike physical footprints which disappear over time, the erasure of digital footprints is futile. One can no longer control what is left behind. Invasion of privacy operates as a sharp needle penetrating one's skin. Human image synthesis through "deepfake" Al transports one's face onto another's body. The giant machine of influence creates bubbles contorting beliefs. Al Sensorium is a reflection on these strange realities, a poetic and fresh perspective that invites the viewer to reflect on their daily interactions in the virtual and physical worlds.

This co-presentation with ODC Theater is part 2 and 3 of DSDT's *inCIVILITY* series—the acclaimed *Outrage Machine* (2018), a combination of motion capture, live interactive visual effects, and the expressive power of dance, and the world premiere of the third and final section, *A Seat at the Table*, in celebration of DSDT's 30th Anniversary season. Inspired by an Adam Gopnick article, "...Who Deserves a Seat at the Table", and Jonathan Swift's "A Modest Proposal", *A Seat at the Table* incorporates themes that join ideas of humanity, power, and place with community input about feeling marginalized, powerless, or even shunned. "If you are not at the table, you are probably on the menu. Nothing is more fundamental to human relations than deciding who has a place at the table—and nothing is more essential to our idea of humanism than expanding that table…" Adam Gopnick, New Yorker.

Company/Artist Bio:

A multi-media award-winning dance company, Deborah Slater Dance Theater does visually gorgeous, acrobatic, talking dance. DSDT is dedicated to the creation of all-original performances exploring timely social issues and creating meaningful paths through life's experience, using dance, education, and outreach to the community. In 1980, Slater co-founded the Mission District-based Studio 210, one of San Francisco's longest continuously operating, affordable, rehearsal and low-tech performance facilities, providing a home for hundreds of independent choreographers and small companies. DSDT is now in its 9th year of a mentorship residency program aimed towards professional development and educational outreach. Slater teaches WAYS NOT TO DROWN workshops, providing exercises and techniques for developing original work.

The Living Earth Show and ODC Theater Co-Present

The ferociously creative percussion-guitar duo The Living Earth Show (Travis Andrews and Andy Meyerson) celebrates its tenth anniversary with *T.L.E.S.tival*. Co-presented with ODC Theater, *T.L.E.S.tival* presents two of the organization's most iconic collaborative productions. *Lordship and Bondage: The Birth of the Negro Superman* (March 6), composed and performed with the singular creative force M. Lamar, is an original ten-movement song cycle featuring texts drawn from Hegel's "Lordship and Bondage" Nietzsche's "Übermensch" and Sun Ra's words on discipline and freedom. The form draws inspiration from Doom Spirituals, classical opera, and the underground aesthetics of Goth and Metal subcultures. *Echoes* (March 7), a spoken word chamber opera foregrounding the voices and stories that are often silenced and marginalized by a changing San Francisco, is created and performed with the inimitable Kronos Quartet, composer Danny Clay, and Youth Speaks: the legendary San Francisco-based organization devoted to combating youth illiteracy, isolation, alienation, and silence.

Company/Artist Bio:

Called "outstanding" by the San Francisco Chronicle, "transcendent" by the Charleston City Paper, and "a fully distorted perpetual motion of awesome" by I Care If You Listen, The Living Earth Show (guitarist Travis Andrews and percussionist Andy Meyerson) is a megaphone and canvas for some of the world's most progressive artists. Partners for *T.L.E.S.tival* include M. Lamar, composer Danny Clay, Ashley Smiley, Youth Speaks, and the Kronos Quartet

Directors unite to premiere *TRIPLE TAKE*, an eclectic trio of new works. Wendy Rein and Ryan T. Smith present Part I of *Shadow*, a deep dive into the data "debris" we leave behind in our current digital age as a reflection of what makes us human. *The Healer*, a premiere by Katerina Wong, mines the ancient history, systems, and beliefs of Traditional Chinese Medicine and holistic practices, to shed light on our innate ability to overcome physical and emotional suffering. For the final piece in the program, all three Artistic Directors join forces on a new work that utilizes the Surrealist "exquisite corpse" drawing game as a framework for their creative process. Rein and Smith, working as a pair and using video conferencing from NY, and Wong working in the studio in SF, take turns building material without seeing each others' previous contributions. In this exploration of process and communication, the company embraces uncertain territory and new possibilities to creation.

Company Bio:

RAWdance is an award-winning contemporary dance company known for transforming theaters and public spaces through a mix of performance, curation, and collaboration. The company's works for stage and screen have been produced throughout the U.S. and in Asia. In 2019 the company expanded to two coasts, with Co-Founders Ryan T. Smith and Wendy Rein shifting to New York's Hudson Valley, and Katerina Wong assuming the role of Co-Artistic Director in San Francisco. RAWdance has been a Resident Company of ODC Theater since 2015.

And the Twins Return is a meditation on bewitchment and calamity, deception and possession, inspired by images from Northern Japan and Southern Mexico. When a fox attaches itself to you, it dunks you into a dream world, controls your thoughts, alters your behavior. The fox is a fickle trickster who brings fortune one day and misfortune the next. We attempt to go backwards in time to find something intact, something old, but there are few clues, so we turn to the unconscious, giving space for flow. Strip away, and listen to hear what our decolonized selves might sound like. And the Twins Return was created during a Japan-US Friendship Commission Artist Fellowship and is influenced by ritual dance practices and yokai (a class of supernatural spirit-monsters in Japanese folklore).

Company/Artist Bio:

Founded in 2001, NAKA Dance Theater creates experimental performance works using dance, storytelling, multimedia installations and site-specific environments. NAKA builds partnerships with communities, engages people's histories and folklore and expresses experiences through accessible performances that challenge the viewer to think critically about social justice issues.

Created specifically for ODC's B.Way Theater with an all Bay Area cast, Alone Together flips the orientation of the proscenium, placing the audience on the stage and the performers in the seats. Other-worldly dreamscapes give way to volcanic dance numbers, ranging from the audacious to the familiar, combining Galasso's signature cinematic approach with a riveting score by composer Dave Cerf. Alone Together premiered in December 2018 and was described by Leah Garchick in the San Francisco Chronicle as "a treasure chest so packed with jewels that the lid won't stay down."

Company/Artist Bio:

Choreographer Catherine Galasso has been creating live performance at the intersection of dance, theater, and installation since 2006. Her cross-disciplinary, cast-specific performance works have been seen at places like Danspace Project, La MaMa, SFMoMA, Bibliotheque National in Paris and MoCA Santa Barbara, as well as underground bank vaults, decaying 4-story homes, and grand marble staircases. Her collaboration with choreographer Andy de Groat (GET DANCING) was nominated for a 2016 New York "Bessie" and her *Bring On The Lumièrel* for a 2012 San Francisco "Izzy." Galasso has been a resident artist with the Lower Manhattan Cultural Council, Brooklyn Arts Exchange, Watermill Center, Headlands Center, and ODC Theater (2009-2012).

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In 1977, Geoff Hoyle became a Dad. In 2015, his son Dan became a Dad. Sometime in between then, they performed together for a bit, but it's been ten years since that happened. And this is the first time they will be performing together as official, card-carrying Dads. They don't know what to expect, but chances are there will be songs, skits, musings, maybe a character or two, and a laugh or three. It will be all completely new. But will feel like they vaguely know what they are doing. Sort of like being a Dad.

Company/Artist Bio:

Dan Hoyle is an actor and writer whose brand of journalistic theater has been hailed as "riveting, funny and poignant" (New York Times) and "hilarious, moving and very necessary" (Salon). His solo shows BORDER PEOPLE, EACH AND EVERY THING, THE REAL AMERICANS, and TINGS DEY HAPPEN have toured the country and overseas including The Public Theater and Culture Project (NYC), Kolkata, India, Dublin, Ireland, and Abuja, Bauchi, Calabar, Lagos, and Jos, Nigeria.

Geoff Hoyle clowned as Mr Sniff in San Francisco's Pickle Family Circus, Cirque du Soleil and Circus Flora. He has appeared many times at ACT, Berkeley Rep, and off-Broadway, performing solo in regional theaters in the US and at festivals in Europe. On Broadway he originated the character of Zazu in, The Lion King. Most recently he performed his solos Geezer and Lear's Shadow at The Marsh. Geoff also narrates ODC's The Velveteen Rabbit.

MARGARET JENKINS AND RINDE ECKERT: MIGRATORY PASSAGES

From the solitary birds to the flocking birds, from the baggage of culture to the nature of culture, Margaret Jenkins and Rinde Eckert premiere a new duet thematically related to their previous 3 duets: *Shorebirds Atlantic*, *And So They*, and *Shadows & Water*. As they shed their birdwatching gear they become more birdlike—the weight of a stone monkey countered now by the lightness of the migratory birds rising from the clear lake to disappear in the distance on their way north or south, to one home or another.

Company/Artist Bio:

Margaret Jenkins is a choreographer, mentor, and designer of unique community-based dance projects like CHIME. After performing in New York and Europe and assisting Merce Cunningham in teaching his work around the world, she opened one of the West Coast's first studio performing spaces, a school for the training of professional dancers and launched her Company in 1973. She was a founding member of the Bay Area Dance Coalition and Dance/USA, and has received numerous awards: a Guggenheim, SFAC Award of Honor, and a Bellagio Fellowship.

Rinde Eckert is a writer, composer, singer, actor, and director whose theater, music theater, and dance theater pieces have been performed throughout the United States and abroad. He has received a Guggenheim in Music Composition, a Marc Blitzstein Award (from The American Academy of Arts and Letters), an Obie Award (And God Created Great Whales), a Grammy Award (Lonely Motel), an Alpert Award (2009), and a Doris Duke Performing Artist Award (2012). He was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in Drama in 2007 for his Orpheus X.

This collection of movement sketches by Robert Moses is drawn from what the choreographer understands to be the penalties leveled when an African American walks away from the fight with dominant culture and has the gaul to find peace in the sound of their own voice and away from the American dream. Musing on the sanctuary of self preservation, the words of August Wilson, Dave Chappelle, Richard Pryor, Malcom X, and the millions of aspiring citizens of Wakanda, these works are punctuated with Moses's signature physicality and virtuosity.

Company/Artist Bio:

The mission of Robert Moses' Kin (RMK) is to produce art and opportunities for community, and further, to support what is specific and unique in our varied human natures. RMK is a platform for focused expressions on race, class, culture, belief, gender, and aspiration. We use each as a medium through which we gain greater understanding and thereby give voice to the existence of expanded possibilities and fullest potential. The work is meant as a testament to expressiveness of the human body, birthed by the spirit. Further, concerns for the honor, dignity, truth, and potential of real people are enshrined in RMK's mission. RMK works to strengthen and blur lines that define and separate us.



Garrett + Moulton Productions will present Gyre and Gimble—a new dance theater work choreographed by Co-Artistic Directors Janice Garrett and Charles Moulton. A spiraling journey through a vivid landscape of movement, image, and sound, this intimate and emotionally charged piece explores the driving human urge to find shared meaning and connection in an increasingly fragmented world. Garrett + Moulton's stellar company will transport the audience into an uplifting and tenderly touching realm that celebrates the triumph of the human heart over isolation and despair.

Leaving the Atocha Station is a work of experimental dance theater inspired by Ben Lerner's acclaimed novel of the same name. In Lerner's postmodern novel about an artist's search for authenticity, the protagonist poet, crippled by irony and doubt, longs to disappear into numbness. But he secretly believes in the power of art. Mohr's work takes the genrebreaking nature of Lerner's auto-fiction as a jumping off point for hybrid theater: part dance improvisation, part monologue, part hallucinatory testimonial for the role of art in precarious times. Featuring two veteran performers, Christian Burns and Wiley Naman Strasser, each of whom embodies a different aspect of the protagonist's conflicted self.

Company/Artists Bio:

Choreographer and writer Hope Mohr makes performance at the intersection of the body and the brain. Her work is both "theory-driven, meticulously constructed" (S.F. Weekly) and gorgeously embodied." (Art Practical). In 2014, Dance Magazine editor-in-chief Wendy Perron named Mohr as one of the "women leaders" in dance. Mohr says: "Poetry can unmake the self that culture has made. Poetry can create space for a self that does not vet exist. When I speak of poetry, I speak of dance. Making a dance feels like doing a million close readings of the body." **ODC Theater Presents**

C*NT deploys Jenkinson's feminist rage to confront the ruptures caused by the stress of difference. As a feminist performing drag, she propels her own body into the history of drag's complex relationship to femaleness: a relationship of fascination, honor, and revulsion. Both the (misogynistic) pathologizing and (feminist) mythologizing around the female body are a source of frustration, fascination, and humor for Jenkinson. Through camp and ironic play, she delights both in deflating misogyny, and poking at the preciousness of contemporary feminism. C*NT holds this multiplicity—the frustration, fascination, and humor—and requires her to grapple with their complexity and simultaneity.


Company/Artist Bio:

Company Bio:

Founded in 1971 by Artistic Director Brenda Way, ODC/Dance is widely recognized for its rigorous technique and groundbreaking collaborations. Recent highlights include appearances at the Brooklyn Academy of Music Next Wave Festival in New York, MODAFE Festival in Seoul Korea, Zellerbach Hall in Berkeley, and in past years, standing-room only engagements in Europe, Rissue, and Asia. ODC is known nationally for its entrepreneurial savvy and was the first modern dance company in the United States to build a home facility, the ODC theater. In 2005, ODC expanded its campus to include the ODC Dance Commons, housing ODC/Dance, ODC School, a pilates studio, and a Healthy Dancers' Clinic.

SKETCH 10: WRECKED will feature world premieres by six renowned choreographers, whose work will showcase the incredible talents of Imagery's company artists. The choreographers will each create a 12-15 minute ballet. Working in pairs, they will "wreck" each other's creations, a process of deconstruction and reconstruction that exposes the inner workings of each piece – laying bare the choreographers' conscious and unconscious habits, and revealing the infinite directions in which ballets can be stretched, reshaped, and expanded. SFDanceworks is celebrating its fifth season this year and returning to ODC Theater under the newly appointed co-directorship of Laura O'Malley and Brett Conway, former dancers and choreographers of SFDanceworks. This season they are excited to present the San Francisco premiere of the bold and distinct, stylistic movement of Marco Goecke's work, Äffi, and two world premieres from internationally acclaimed artists Bryan Arias and Drew Jacoby.

Company/Artist Bio:

SFDanceworks was founded in 2014 by James Sofranko, former soloist with the San Francisco Ballet and current artistic director of Grand Rapids Ballet. His vision was to create a repertory company dedicated to the past, present, and future of dance. In the past four years SFDanceworks has presented an annual summer season featuring works from some of the most sought after choreographers in the world, in addition to supporting the development of new artists. SFD has presented works by Nacho Duato, Alejandro Cerrudo, Christopher Bruce, Lar Lubovitch, Penny Saunders, Jose Limon, Danielle Rowe, Brett Conway, Laura O'Malley, Olivier Wevers, Andrea Schermoly, Dana Genshaft, James Graham, and Sofranko. With high caliber dancers and top quality productions, SFDanceworks has quickly risen to critical acclaim.





ODC Theater Unplugged is a recurring platform offering a rare and candid look into the creative process. This edition features developing work by randy reves and jose abad, who through individual work craft contemporary choreographic rituals through movement research and durational movement practices, sound design and composition, installation and sculptural elements via a BIQTPOC lens. Their respective travels to home countries of Guatemala and the Philippines, as well as patterns of migration, will inform the work to be shared.

Company/Artist Bio:

randy reves is a queer, Afro-Guatemalan choreographer, performance artist, and healer born in NJ. They currently make art in the Bay Area after oscillating between here, LA, Berlin, and NYC. randy is interested in choreography as a process of excavation, task as meditation, psychosomatic state work (grief, joy, praise), Chinese Energetics, and getting messy by conjuring contemporary rituals within quotidian and natural landscapes. Additionally, randy is envisioning club spaces as sites of generative dissonance and asks, "Are we celebrating or mourning or both? How do we prepare for the not yet seen?"

jose e abad is a queer social practice performance artist based in San Francisco, CA who is exploring queer futurity through an intersectional lens. Born in Olongapo City, Philippines to a Filipinx Mother and a West Indian Father, jose uses dance and storytelling to explore the complexities of cultural identity, feelings of landlessness, and the memories and wisdom held within the body that the mind has forgotten, or history has erased. abad has had the opportunity to perform in New York, New Orleans, and San Francisco in collaboration with a variety of companies and artists including Keith Hennessy, Scott Wells, Anne Bluethenthal, Brontez Purnell Dance Company, #DignityInProcess, and Detour Dance.

inkboat commissions award winning interdisciplinary artist, Ann Carlson to make The Ones We Fell Among (working title). This multi-phased performance project muses and reflects upon the movements, mythologies, behaviors and perceptions of earth's largest land mammal, the elephant. With wild quiet and clumsy grace, Carlson borrows from the real, the imagined, and the symbolic to build a world of wonder and reckoning for master performers Shinichi Iova-Koga and Dana Iova-Koga.

Company/Artist Bio:


